LUMC Fall Teaching Series - Christian Ethics for the Twenty-First Century – November 3 and 4

We are living in an increasingly complex world that requires us to make difficult ethical decisions. One current example is the debate in Canada on physician assisted suicide. As a way of responding to this we have invited Dr. Elmer Thiessen for our Fall Teaching Series to address the topic of Christian ethics. This series is meant to help us understand the challenge of living ethically in today's postmodern society, to see the urgency of living ethically, and to apply the Bible to ethical questions, both old and new.

Dr. Thiessen has taught philosophy and ethics at the university and college level for over 35 years, both in Ontario and Alberta. He has published widely in the area of the philosophy of religious education and religious schooling. He and his wife Maggie attend Waterloo North Mennonite Church, where they are active members.



Harvesting Fruit

Well I said we would do it and we did it. Tina and I climbed into the Toews' tomato harvester on a warm September morning and got to work in our rubber gloves and closed toed shoes. I did not know what to expect. I just waited for the action to start. I had never seen a tomato harvester in my life nor had I ever worked a produce farm in any capacity. But still there I stood between two seasoned veterans of the farm who also happened to be teenagers.

We rumbled forward as a large tractor of some sort pulled an empty wagon alongside the contraption I now stood in. A small heap of tomatoes plopped onto the conveyor belt accompanied by some debris; sticks and whatnot. The tomatoes sat there while the sticks were disposed of down a slit between me and the conveyor belt that led back down to terra firma. The whatnot went too.

"Not so bad," I thought to myself. "A few tomatoes at a time can't be too hard for six people." I eased into a quarter squat preparing for the next batch. But the next batch was a bona fide tomato avalanche. If I had to estimate I'd say it was somewhere between a bazillion and a gajillion tomatoes flowing past us all at once. My left hand did not know what my right hand was doing because my brain did not know how to manage two hands and a gushing of tomatoes at the same time.

My job and the job of my sweaty companions was simple, let the ripe red tomatoes go by and swipe up the green or rotten ones and put them down the crevace where the debris and the whatnot had previously been banished. I did my best. I promise I did. But by the end of the first load, a mere 16 tonnes of toms, I broke. I heaved myself off the rig and heaved my morning coffee out of my stomach and into the hedgerow, another new thing I learned about. Yes. I puked. Not once, but twice. The steady flow of tomatoes combined with the rumbling of the cabin was too much for this city slicker. But I would not be defeated. I'm no quitter. Unless it's soft drinks. I climbed back onto that rocking carriage of destiny I put my head down and I grabbed as much rotten tomato as my hands could scoop. And then, with sweat on my brow and wind in my hair I puked again. Right off the blasted tractor onto the precious ground below. On that warm September morning I was defeated by the infamous Leamington tomato and I loved it.

I loved it because I learned to hear Jesus in a new way. An agricultural, closer to first century kind of way. And I was struck by an interesting thought before I was struck by nausea. That thought was about harvesting and the Kingdom. In the parable of the sower (Mat.13:1-23) we read about the good soil which is called good because it bears good fruit. We also read about a great harvest at the end of the age where wheat and weeds will be separated (Mat.13:24-30). The wheat, that which bears the useful fruit will be saved while the weeds will be cast aside. Jesus tells his disciples to pray for labourers because the harvest is ready (Mat.9:35-38).

What are they harvesting? Not weeds or rot but Fruit! And what is the fruit? Maybe it's wheat or maybe tomatoes. Or maybe the fruit looks like love, joy, peace, patience, goodness, gentleness, kindness, faithfulness, and self-control. Maybe as we walk through the world with eyes to see and ears to hear, knowing there is fruit to be harvested, we get the delight of finding fruit ready for harvest. That fruit is among our neighbours waiting to be encouraged and affirmed, called out for a rich harvest.

Of course, the harvest comes before the great family meal where brothers and sisters enjoy that which has grown and ripened.

It's awesome. It's so awesome I could puke.
